The Institute for Social and Economic Change, Bangalore, was registered as a Society under the Mysore Societies Registration Act of 1960 on 20th January 1972, and much of the preparatory work involving consultations and negotiations with the Government of India, Government of Mysore, and enrolment of founder members etc., was undertaken by Dr V K R V Rao in his capacity as founder and promoter of the Institute.

2. The first appointments to the Institute were made within less than three months of the registration of the Institute. Apart from Dr V K R V Rao, who was named as Director and Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Institute in the Memorandum of Association, Professor M N Srinivas, Head of the Department of Sociology, University of Delhi, joined the Institute on 1st May as Senior Fellow in Sociology and Joint Director. Also joining on 1st May were Dr S Seshaiiah (of the Institute of Economic Growth) as Fellow in Sociology, and Mr V S Parthasarathy (of the Delhi University Department of Sociology) as Research Associate in Sociology. Dr H K Mazumdar joined the I S E C as Senior Fellow in Economics on 1st July 1972.

3. The Institute began functioning in May in a modest way in three rooms in the Director's residence in Bangalore. On 1st June the Institute shifted to a hired

building in Jayanagar (7A, Krishna Kripa, 8th Block West). In the meanwhile, negotiations with the Mysore Government were carried on for securing Carlton House on a temporary basis as soon as the offices of the Bangalore University were shifted from there. Bangalore University shifted its offices to its new campus in February 1973 and the Institute moved into the vacated building (Carlton House) in March 1973. This arrangement is also temporary and the Institute expects to move to its own building on its campus near Nagarbhavi village on the Bangalore-Mysore Road during the next two years or so. Designs for the Institute's new building have been completed and tenders have been invited for construction. Messrs. Chandavarkar and Thackar are the architects, with Mr Kanvinde, the well-known specialist on campus designs, as consulting architect. It is hoped to start construction some time in July 1973.

4. Members will be glad to know that with the shifting of the Institute to Carlton House, most of its accommodation problems have been solved for the time being.

5. Most of the permanent staff have now been appointed and are in position. Two faculty members are expected to join towards the end of August soon after returning from the United States, and two or three more have yet to be appointed. The Institute is in a position to undertake its regular long-term work as from the beginning of the academic year 1973-74 commencing on 1st July. A list of the staff of the Institute is given in Appendix 1.

6. Except for Prof. M N Srinivas and Prof. V L S Prakasa Rao who were invited to join the Institute as Senior Fellows in Sociology, and Human Geography and Ecology, respectively, the appointments of other staff members were made on the basis of recommendations of selection committees duly constituted under the bye-laws of the Institute.

7. Members will be glad to know that the financial problems of the Institute have almost been solved, at least for some time to come. The Government of India is making an annual grant of Rs. 5 lakhs to the Institute, and so is the Mysore Government, which thus gives the Institute a stable income of Rs. 10 lakhs a year. In addition, the Government of India have sanctioned setting up a Demographic and Communication Action Research Centre, and an Agricultural Development and Rural Transformation Centre. These Centres involve an annual expenditure of about Rs. 2.5 to 3 lakhs, and this is met by annual grants by the Ministry of Health and Family Planning, and the Ministry of Food and Agriculture, respectively.

8. As regards the non-recurring expenditure of the Institute, the Government of India have made a grant of Rs. 50 lakhs and this has been matched by a similar grant from the Mysore Government, bringing the total to one crore rupees. From this amount, about Rs. 65 lakhs are being earmarked for construction of new campus for the Institute, Rs. 15 lakhs for the purchase of books and equipment and Rs. 10 lakhs for setting up a City Centre for the Institute in Bangalore so that

the citizens of Bangalore can take advantage of the Institute even after it shifts to its new campus. The remaining Rs. 10 lakhs will be used for other non-recurring purposes connected with the Institute.

9. Within the short period during which the Institute has been functioning as from June 1972, a considerable measure of academic work has been carried out, besides the vast amount of work involved in setting up the Institute. Thus, the faculty have run a fortnightly seminar in the two disciplines of Economics and Sociology for the college teachers in Bangalore. In September 1972, a seminar was held on the subject of "Social Science Research and Mysore's Development" in which 56 persons - officers of Mysore Government, teachers in economics, sociology, geography and education from the Universities of Mysore, Bangalore and Karnatak and the University of Agricultural Sciences, Bangalore, Indian Institute of Science and Indian Statistical Institute, Bangalore, and Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Poona - participated, providing an excellent opportunity for a fruitful dialogue between academics and administrators. The Institute also organised a successful National Seminar on Social Change where 35 distinguished academicians from various parts of India participated. The first seminar was inaugurated by the Chief Minister of Mysore, Shri Devaraj Urs, and the second by the Vice President of India, Shri G S Pathak, who is also the President of the Institute. Valuable papers were submitted at both the seminars providing the bases for stimulating discussion. The

papers are now in the process of being edited and would be published shortly. The expenses of both the seminars were borne by the Indian Council of Social Science Research, New Delhi.

10. Since January 1973, the Institute has been running an evening course in research methodology for college teachers who wanted to undertake research but were handicapped by a lack of knowledge of research methods and techniques. It is a matter of gratification to the Director and the faculty that the fortnightly seminars and the research methodology course have both met a felt-need and evoked appreciation from the academic community in Bangalore.

11. Strenuous efforts were made during this period to build up the Institute's library. Apart from the large number of books and reports which were purchased, substantial gifts of books and reports have been secured from national and international institutions. At the rate at which the library is expanding, I feel confident that in due course it will become a major attraction for research scholars not only in the South but also in other parts of India.

12. During the period under review, the faculty of the Institute have also been engaged in research work. A brief report on the research work in progress in the Institute is given in Appendix 2.

13. The faculty of the Institute was also able to complete some papers which either have been published

in 1972-73 or will be published in 1973-74. A list of these papers is given in Appendix 3.

14. Members will be glad to know that the Institute has been recognised as an Institute for training Ph. D. students in the social sciences by the Universities of Mysore, Bangalore and Karnatak. The Jawaharlal Nehru University has also indicated its willingness to establish academic/collaborative relations with the Institute.

15. As the General Body is meeting on 1st July, or three months after the completion of the year under review, I think it will be appropriate to apprise the members of the progress that the Institute has made during the period April-June 1973 also.

16. The faculty of the Institute was strengthened by the addition of Dr N A Sarma who resigned his post as Economic Adviser to the Associated Chambers of Commerce and Industry, New Delhi, and joined the Institute, at considerable personal sacrifice, as Senior Fellow in Economics. Prof. L S Venkataramanan of the Indian Agricultural Research Institute has also joined as Senior Fellow in Agricultural Economics for a period of two years in the first instance. A number of other appointments were also made during this period.

17. The Institute is also fortunate in securing the honorary services of Dr A C Deve Gowda as honorary Senior Fellow in Education. During the period under review Shri J P Naik, Member-Secretary, Indian

Council of Social Science Research, New Delhi, also accepted the Institute's invitation to be an honorary Visiting Senior Fellow in Education, and delivered two lectures on May 7 and 8, 1973, on 'The Research and Development Effort in Education'. The Institute proposes to start its first series of publications, 'I S E C Papers on Social Sciences', with Shri Naik's lectures.

18 In co-operation with the Planning Department of the Mysore Government, the Institute organised a District Planning Officer's Training Programme. A contingent of three persons came from each district comprising of the district planning officer, deputy director of agriculture of the district, and a lecturer in economics from a government college in the district. The programme started on 14th April 1973. The first phase of the programme lasted for three weeks and was completed on May 5, 1973. Thirty-seven lectures-cum-discussions were held, of which 22 were undertaken by the senior officers of the Mysore Government and the rest by the Institute faculty. The programme was inaugurated by the Union Planning Minister, Shri D P Dhar who warmly welcomed the idea of a training course for district planners and expressed the hope that similar courses would be instituted in other States. I may say with confidence that the Institute has broken new ground in translating into concrete measures, at the district level, blue-prints for economic development drawn up at all-India and State levels. The trainees have gone to their respective districts and have

been asked to prepare an approach paper for the development of their districts to be sent to the Director by 20th June. The trainees will re-assemble on 2nd July for the second phase of the programme when concrete discussions will be held on district planning in the light of the approach papers drawn up for their respective districts. It is hoped that, as a result of this programme, grassroots planning will get a concrete meaning as far as Mysore State is concerned.

19. During the same period, preliminary work was undertaken for preparing a perspective plan for Mysore. The perspective covers a 15 year period as from 1974-75. In addition to several group meetings which were held in Bangalore, the Director was able to arrange group meetings in the Institute of Economic Growth, Delhi. Prof D U Sastry of the Institute of Economic Growth, has joined I S E C for a period of five months to help us in preparing the perspective plan. Meetings have been held with the leaders of political parties in the State in order to inform ourselves of what the leaders of public opinion in the State consider to be the felt needs and expectations of the people for the period covered by the perspective plan. We have started collecting the necessary data for the project and have also been assured of full co-operation by the Government of Mysore in this undertaking. The Institute expects to have the perspective plan ready by November this year.

20 A research project on a comprehensive socio-

economic survey of Bangalore City has also been commenced in right earnest. The costs of this project are to be met by a grant of Rs. 2 lakhs by the Indian Council of Social Science Research and a grant of Rs. 70,000 by the Mysore Government. The project is under the directorship of Prof. V L S Prakasa Rao. The required staff have largely been recruited and the necessary preliminary data are being collected. The project was inaugurated on June 3, 1973 by the Mayor of Bangalore City.

21. During this period also the Library has made substantial acquisitions of books and journals, and we are already beginning to experience difficulties with regard to storage and display. I would like to highlight the fact that in accordance with our policy of equipping the library for research, we have ordered back numbers of important learned journals in areas in which we are interested and when the volumes are received, our library will be comparable to the Ratan Tata Library of Delhi School of Economics, the Library of the Departments of Economics and Sociology in Bombay University and the Library of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Poona.

22. The Institute has decided to start, as from the beginning of 1973-74, a nine-month course in research methodology, on the successful completion of which candidates will be awarded certificates. The Institute is also proposing to recruit a small number of students for its Ph. D. programme, and award a minimum of six research fellowships for the purpose during the first academic year.

23. During the academic year 1973-74, it is proposed to organise a joint seminar in collaboration with Asian Mass Communication Research and Information Centre, Singapore, on 'Regional Conference on Communication and Change in Rural Asia' in August-September this year. We may also hold a National Seminar on Economic Change in 1974.
24. It is proposed to set up a number of inter-disciplinary cells each with a small core staff but working under the guidance of an inter-disciplinary committee and under the direction of a senior member of one of the regular academic units in the Institute. Three such inter disciplinary cells are contemplated during the year 1973-74, namely, Mysore Cell, Backward Regions Cell and Backward Classes Cell. Inter-disciplinary work is already under way in regard to its project on Bangalore City Survey and Mysore's Perspective Planning and in its training programmes on Research Methodology and District Planning.
25. It is also proposed to strengthen the full-time staff of the units in Economics, Sociology and Education during the year 1973-74 and set up a new unit in Development Administration. These new units as well as the items referred to in the previous para have been made possible because of the Government of India agreeing to give the Institute an annual grant of Rs. 5 lakhs in the place of Rs. 2.5 lakhs they had sanctioned last year.
26. Following a discussion with the Administrator of the Ghataprabha and Malaprabha project, discus-

sions are now under way for setting up a cell in the Institute to undertake continuous research work on the socio-economic changes relating to the area development in the ayacut covered by the two irrigation projects. The cell will be working on the various problems that will arise in the course of developing the area and thereby assisting the Administrator.

27. Members will be glad to know that Dr M G Kanbur of the University of Birmingham is likely to join the Institute in 1973-74 as a Senior Visiting Fellow in Agricultural Economics. During the period of his Fellowship he will be working on a project: "An econometric study on the production function and supply responses to prices in agriculture in Mysore State." Professor P S Dhruvarajan of the University of Manitoba, Canada, will be in the Institute as a Visiting Professor in June and July 1973 and will take part in the research seminars of the Institute.

28. The Institute has been requested by the Mysore Government to train selected officers in the Bureau of Economics and Statistics in data analysis and report writing and this course is likely to begin at the Institute some time in July-August this year. There has also been some discussion on instituting a few short-period training programme in Education for educational administrators in the State but details are still to be finalised.

29. I will be failing in my duty if I do not place on record the profound sense of gratitude of myself, all my fellow founder members and all my colleagues in

the Institute for the generous support which we have received from the Government of Mysore and the Government of India in financing both the recurring and capital expenditure of the Institute. The Government of Mysore, first under President's rule when Shri Dhama Vira was the Governor, and subsequently under popular rule of Shri Devraj Urs, Chief Minister of Mysore, has been exceedingly helpful right from the start. I am very thankful to them for the great confidence they have shown without which we would not have been stimulated to make the rapid progress which has been made. The Government of India, and particularly the Prime Minister, Education Minister and the Finance Minister, have all taken personal interest in the development of the Institute and I am deeply grateful to them for the help they have given me through the Government of India for putting the Institute on a sound and stable basis.

30. In conclusion, I would like to express my satisfaction at the splendid start that the Institute has made not only in solving its accommodation and financial problems and the recruitment of the faculty, but even more in terms of the atmosphere of fellowship and participative activity which has been established in the Institute. I should like to express my warm thanks first to my colleague Professor M N Srinivas who joined me in the initial work of bringing this Institute into existence as Joint Director and has now for understandable reasons, given up his administrative functions in the Institute. I would also like

to thank all my academic colleagues who have put up with my way of working and who have succeeded in creating an atmosphere which I am sure will be envied by other Institutions both in the country and aboard. I would also like to thank the Registrar and his administrative team for the hard work and long hours they have put in during the year. Finally, I must express my warm thanks to my distinguished colleagues on the Board of Governors who have given me complete understanding and unstinting support in all that I have tried to do towards the rapid building up of the Institute. I think I am now in a position to say that the foundations of the Institute have been well and truly laid. We can look forward to a period of active functioning and rapid progress.
